Managing the City's Historic Preservation Program is a tad like herding cats: you have to have patience, you have to be willing to let one or more wander off, you have to love what you do. Historic preservation is about balance: balancing new ideas and infill development with respect for the past. The best cities are in fact a mix of old and new. This presentation will provide a summary of the City's historic preservation program, highlight some of Fresno's architectural jewels and provide responses to misconceptions about why we preserve.



Karana Hattersley-Drayton has a M.A. and three years of coursework towards her Ph.D. in Architectural History at U.C. Berkeley. She served three years on the State Historical Resources Commission and on the Board of Directors for the Vernacular Architecture Forum. She was the Chair for the VAF's annual conference which met in Fresno in May 2008. Karana moved to Fresno in 1999 to work as an architectural historian for Caltrans District

District 6 and in June of 2002 was hired as the City of Fresno's Historic Preservation Project Manager. She chairs the Development and Resource Management Department's Fresno Green Team and the Public Art Committee. She has taught courses in California architecture and American urbanism at Sonoma State and most recently for the OSHER Institute at Fresno State. Areas of interest include the vernacular, gendered and ethnic landscapes of the San Joaquin Valley, sustainability and preservation. The 2008 publication, "Architecture, Ethnicity and Historic Landscapes of the San Joaquin Valley," for which she wrote several articles and served as Executive Editor, won a California Preservation Foundation and a 2009 Governor's Historic Preservation award.
