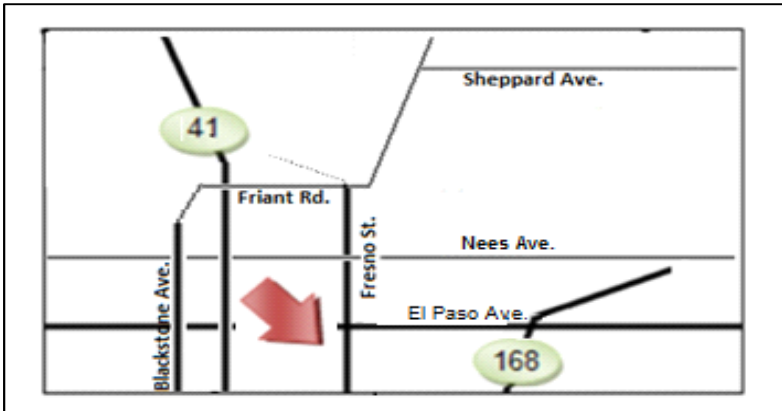

Michael Carbajal began his career in the water industry in 2000. In 2002, Michael gained employment with the City of Fresno, and in 2012 Michael was appointed as Program Manager in the Public Utilities Department, where he manages the Program Management and Engineering Office.

As Program Manager, Michael oversees the overall execution of the Division's \$429 million capital improvement plan, **Recharge Fresno**. Daily, he manages the Water Division's complex water program and ensures efficient delivery of projects in a timely manner, within the scope of the project budget. In addition to program management, Michael's responsibilities include protecting the Water Division's 1,780 miles of distribution pipeline and over 140,000 customer connections.

Michael earned an associate degree in Business Administration from Fresno City College in 2006. He furthered his education at California State University, Fresno, where he obtained a Bachelor of Arts degree in Business Administration.

Recharge Fresno

Recharge Fresno is the City's program to improve the pipelines and water system facilities that will capture, treat and deliver water to Fresno homes and businesses, including surface water from the Sierra Nevada Mountains. We continue to pump more water from the ground than we put back each year.

Groundwater levels are dropping by approximately one foot each year. We don't know how long this can go on, but we do know there is a limited amount of water, and that at the current rate of depletion, groundwater will be harder and more expensive to reach. The City spends more than \$8 million every year on energy to pump water from the ground.
